1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Salbari College was established on the 14th of November, 1983 by the conscious educationists and guardians of the locality with mere public donations amidst their poor socio-economic conditions prevailing at that time. They took the bold step of starting the first ever Higher Education Institute of the area for the benefit of the poor aspiring students of greater Salbari area. They named it "Salbari College" with a view of establishing the name of the area in the educational map of Assam through its contribution to the education field. The College opened undergraduate courses in 1986 and was affiliated to Gauhati University. It was then bifurcated into two separate entities viz. senior secondary school (then Junior College) and Degree College in 1997. In the same year, the one which retained the nomenclature 'SALBARI COLLEGE' was shifted to its own permanent campus. Since then, the college had been running undergraduate courses under Gauhati University till 2020-21 (final year batch 2022) and its affiliation has been shifted to Bodoland University from the same academic year.

It was registered under Section 2 (f) and 12(B) of UGC act, 1956 vide notification No. 8-371/2006(CP) and obtained Govt. concurrence and certified by ASHE (All India Survey of Higher Education).

The beautiful campus of Salbari- College is spread over 38 Bighas and 17 lessas of land. The College has completed 4 decades since its inception and has developed computing facility, Internet connectivity, a dedicated power supply system and a relatively small but rich library housing a huge collection of books and journal etc.

The College was brought under the purview of provincialization in 2013 under the 'The Assam Venture Educational Institution Provincialization (Provincialization of Services) Act. 2011 and 2012 as amended. The College is located at Salbari opposite to SDO(C) which is in the heart of Salbari Sub-Division in the District of Baksa (Erstwhile Barpeta) in Bodoland Territorial Council of Assam and at the feet of world famous heritage site Manas National Park.

Vision

Salbari College was established with a view to uplift the educational scenario of the area by imparting higher education to the budding talents. The College was established with certain visions which are mentioned herewith.

- 1. To provide quality education to the students of the locality.
- 2. To empower the students with knowledge through value based education.
- 3. To upgrade the backward and rural students of adjacent villages.
- 4. To enhance the educational, social, economical, cultural, and political aspects of the area in particular and the state and the country in general.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

The college is located along side the Indo-Bhutan border and adjacent to the World heritage site Manas National Park.

The institution has dedicated teaching and non-teaching staff. As the college is situated in a TSP area, the students hailing from different areas to the institution belongs mainly to the Scheduled Tribe.

The college has a automated and well stocked library. Besides, each department has its own departmental library.

The college has separate departmental establishment which has provided easy access to the student-teacher centric activity.

The college has broadband internet connectivity, Wi-Fi access for students and staff, LCD projector, Gymnasium, auditorium, Girls' Hostel, playground, smart class room, plastic free eco friendly campus, drinking water facility, cycle stand, indoor stadium, Dr. BR Ambedkar Guest house within college campus

The college implements all university curriculums effectively and dedicates for a good outcome of the every performance performed by the students looking forward to the progression of higher studies.

The college also organizes departmental seminars/workshops, various awareness campaign.

India Movement(August 2019), 400th birth anniversary of Bir Lachit (November 2022), President's colour award (2022) etc.

The institution has adopted one village namely Gyatigaon, a fringe village of Manas National Park as a clean village. A MoU has also been signed with NGO Manas Ever welfare Society (MEWS) in order to augment the cleanliness activity in the village.

The students of the college are encouraged in publishing their creative thoughts in the annual college magazine (Salbarian) as well as in the departmental wall magazine and college wall magazine (Padumshree). Besides the college publishes departmental wall magazine.

The College maintains a good cooperation harmonious relationship with the society and provides service in its own capacity.

The teachers are also involved in the social service and other programs those are meant for the progression of the society.

A good teacher-student relationship is maintained in the College.

Up to the mark performance by the students in the academic as well as in the extra curricular activities.

The institution has a computer laboratory with 10 nos of computers with Wi-Fi connectivity.

Institutional Weakness

The main disadvantage of the college is that it has no freedom in formulating a curriculum of its own, because curriculum is fully designed by the affiliating university and the college has no choice in this matter. The weaknesses of the college may be underlined as following-

The College is located in a remote area.

Financial limitation.

The area belongs is TSP.

Guardians of the locality are mainly cultivators and not conscious enough.

The institution can strive to eliminate the infrastructural limitations with the grants received from govt. of Assam and BTR.

Institutional Opportunity

The institution is capable of providing ample opportunities to the students.

The infrastructure of the college is up to date which is adjacent to the Sub-Divisional Civil Administrative establishment and local Police Station

Geographical location of the college is easily accessible to the stakeholders of the college due to its landmark

The college is located near the Manas National Park and it is only 8 K.M away from main tourist gate.

The College is situated in a peaceful location and campus is herbal and green.

Faculty exchange programme with nearby educational institution for curricular and allied enrichment of students and teachers.

College has a functional effective E-governance system and provide Wi-Fi to the students.

To create faith and confidence among the stakeholders and society regarding the positive changes in the college and curriculum.

To streamline and strengthen various exchange program through MoU and collaborations.

The institution promotes more society-oriented outreach programmes

Motivate participation of students in State and National level sporting and cultural events.

Certificate and add on course are provided with a view to enhance the skill of the students in order to cope them with the challenging world.

Institutional Challenge

The teachers remain under pressure in course completion because regular classes are always hampered by the additional assignment of govt. duties like election duty, supervising officer in HSLC exam, external evaluator in gunatsov, survey etc.

Minimizing the rate of drop out students is a great challenge for our college. Economy, defense service, marriage are some of the causes of drop out in the college.

A great challenge is involvement of guardians and parents and alumni of the college in different activities. Most of the guardians are illiterate and indifferent to the problems their siblings facing in their day to day life.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Salbari College was previously affiliated to the Gauhati University. But from academic session 2020-21 the college has been affiliated to Bodoland University as per the order of the Govt. of Assam. The Gauhati University affiliation got terminated with the end of sixth semester exam of in 2022.

The curriculum is generally prepared by the affiliating university. The college offers undergraduate courses both Honours and Regular in choice based credit system (CBCS) in humanity departments' viz. English, Assamese, Bodo, Philosophy, Political Science, Economics, Education and history in arts stream. The college The college offers honours course in all departments. The college has also been started UG courses in Science stream in Botany, Chemistry, Mathematics, Physics and Zoology from the academic session 2023-24 under FYUG of NEP 2020.

The affiliating university provides the college entire syllabus, examination schedule, question papers, holiday list etc.

Student community mainly belongs to the scheduled Tribe community. The college offers ample opportunity to the ST/SC students.

The institution encourages the faculty members to go for research, to attend RC/OP, to participate national and international seminar, workshop, FDP etc.

For effective deliberation of curriculum in the class room, teaching staff prepares own lesson plans for both honours and regular courses which includes teaching hour, topic to be taught and other co-curricular tasks to be conducted during the academic session and progress is regularly monitored by the head of the department.

On the basis of the theoretical knowledge, the students do field surveys, socio-economic surveys etc for project work. At end of the every academic session, course completion overviews and review of examination result are done by the authority in the IQAC meeting.

The college encourages the faculty members to innovative learning process through seminars, symposiums etc.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The College website as well as the prospectus provides all relevant information regarding admission, institutional facilities, rules and regulations etc. The admission into the college is made on the basis of merit in the previous examination of the students. Sports talents hailing from our locality are given special concession in the admission. Students belonging to the ST, SC, OBC etc are eligible for availing various opportunities as per the rules and directives of govt. of Assam and University. Students belonging to the economically weaker section and BPL category are given free ships and other concessions.

The faculty members adopt innovative approaches to teaching and learning process by introducing internet, LCD projector, field work, socio-economic surveys etc. Students are provided with academic, personal and psycho-social support and career guidance services by the faculty members and as well as by the various cells in the college. The college has collection of text books, reference books, journals, news paper etc which are collected through funding of the authority. Syllabus, question papers of undergraduate examinations etc. are kept in the library. The departmental establishments have their own libraries. Students counseling and career guidance cell helps students to cope with the demands of competitive examinations. Over all environment of teaching learning in college is good which attracts the learners to seek admission min the college.

The College monitors the quality of teaching learning through IQAC and other concerned cells through collection of the feedback from the students and other stake holders. The college offers "Best Graduate" award to highest percentage securing student in the final examination which is funded by Dr. Kamal Bodosa.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The research and publication cell of the institution encourages the faculty members to promote the research works. In campus facility for augmenting research work is not satisfactory. Internet breakdown etc also hampers daily activities of the researchers. Some of our teachers have engaged themselves in the minor

research project. The faculty members also publish their research work in the journals. Five numbers of our faculty has been awarded Ph D degree from different university of India. The faculty members of the College participates in national, international seminars etc and publish their papers in the proceedings of the relevant seminars. The faculty members also publishes their articles in books, do translations etc. the college authority provides the faculty members the facility of computing, printing, Photostatting etc.

The college undertook different types of extension activities like community development, social work, health awareness, Health camp, environmental awareness program, etc. The College has adopted Gyatigaon, a fringe village of Manas National Park, as a clean village. The NSS unit organizes programs like cleanliness drive, plantation program and other social work. The women study cell organizes awareness programs to address the gender related issues like sexual harassment, responsibility of women in the society etc.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The total area of the college is 23.87 acre. The college campus i.e. total constructed area is spread around 11.89 acre. One part of the remaining portion is used as the college playground measuring 8.43 acre and rest of the land has the establishment of Salbari Senior Secondary School. The college authority has been trying to provide sufficient class rooms and students facilities. The college has got a newly built library building equipped with automated system. The library has a collection of 15,263 texts books, 6865 reference books and 17 books with complete accession and numbering system.

For uninterrupted power supply the college has installed 25 KV DG. Besides, the college has a solar power project of 40 KV which is presently lying inactive. The college has also installed standalone solar lamps at the strategic points of college campus. The College auditorium is equipped with projector. There are two digital class rooms in the college and two smart class rooms.

Student Support and Progression

The main tool of the support is prospectus of the college. It is updated annually. All information viz. college admission, fee structure, library facilities, students union, NCC, NSS, rules and regulation, courses offered, financial support and other relevant information are contained in the prospectus. The college publishes annual magazine known as "SALBARIAN" offering the students community to express their inherent talents. It is also the store house of achievement of the college from the different angle viz. games & Sports, culture, literature.

Reserved categories viz. ST, SC, and OBC students are eligible for Govt. of India Scholarships. The college also provides free admission to the economically weaker section, sports persons and students showing excellence in their student life.

The college provides special care to the students in the field of games and sports. The college has earned hatrick in girls Kabaddi under Gauhati University.

The college organises career counselling program, health camp, recruitment counselling in defence forces, sports related training especially football, volleyball etc.

The institution collects feedback from the outgoing students. The information collected from the students is used for the improvement of the teaching-learning process and the infrastructure development.

The college has an elected Students Union Body.

Salbari College Alumni Association keeps records of the alumnae of the College keeps contact with them.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The Governing Body of the college is the highest decision making body in the college with the principal as its secretary. The principal plays leading role in the management and governance of the institution. The college has an effective internal management system under the leadership of the Principal. The plans and the policies of the college are decided by the GB of the college and principal of the college monitor the implementation of the various strategies through the various cells constituted by the GB of the college all the stack holders viz. students, teachers, alumni association, local bodies, local guardians, govt and semi govt institution etc. The development of the institution is manifested in the class room extension, providing additional facilities, Wi-Fi facilities, inclusion of new faculties, and other relevant infrastructural components.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The institution organizes gender equity promotion programme. Women cell organizes programs on gender sanitization programmes like awareness campaign, women day programmes etc. Green Audit Committee looks after the matter of promoting environment friendly ecosystem in the college. The institution organizes campaign on effect on waste material, energy conservation, wildlife conservation etc.

The institution has adopted one villages namely Gyatigaon as a cleanand green village. In this village the institution organizes educational awareness program, brainstorming program and cleanliness drive, cultural programs, Yoga, community walk, literary programs etc. The institution has also installed numbers of dustbin in the village.

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time-bound and efficient

Response:

The College is affiliated to the Bodoland University and therefore follows the rules and regulations of the University in respect of examination and other relevant matters.

- The college has a transparent mechanism both in University and internal examination. All possible procedures are adopted in order to maintain the quality of assessment.
- The evaluation system is basically framed by the University through the syllabus covering 80% of the marks for each of the papers except AECC and SEC which contain 50 marks. On the other hand, the remaining 20% is at the disposal of the college. The 20% of the marks is accrued from the sessional Examinations conducted by the college exam board.
- The answer scripts of the sessional examinations are preserved for future reference. Each department monitors the percentage of the students and displayed at departmental notice board. For running the examinations at the university and College level, the college constitutes examination committees which are entrusted with maintaining the transparency of the examinations.

Evaluation Mechanism of the Exams may be highlighted as follows:

- Our college has two tier mechanisms of grievance Redressal in respect of providing transparency to the students. Generally the college follows the University rules and procedure in evaluation process.

4. The Context:

The Gyatigaon a village in the main entrance of the Manas National Park. The has village 184 households of which 13.04% of the households belongs to Adivasi, 16.85% belongs to general category, 15.23% of the households belongs to Scheduled Tribes, 41.85% households belongs to Other Backward Classes and 13.04% of the households belongs to Scheduled Caste category .The educated number of people of the village is very less.

Salbari College entered into MoU with Manas Ever Welfare Society (MEWS) 10/01/2020 and decided to embark the clean and green campaign in the villege jointly.

5. The Practice:

To achieve the goal a three Eco-camp was organized from 11/02/2023 to 13/02/2023 were conducted.

5. The practice:

For executing the purpose three nearby villages were chosen the name of the villages are Salbari, Pakriguri and Palsiguri. The name of the persons are:

- 1. Parma Bala Baro of Pakriguri and
- 2. Khandi Boro of North Salbari.

A team of students along with assigned professor in charge and guide visited the household of aforesaid Persons in order to meet the persons and to gather firsthand knowledge of their activities and practice.

6. Evidence of Success:

The key of success of this practice is knowledge of herbs and its use as medicine.

During the visit to the destined villages to meet the persons practicing the traditional medicine and the team encountered wonderful knowledge on the herbs and its usefulness.

The team met smt. Parma Bala Baro and Khandi Boro at own own house and discussed about the practice she has been involving since long.

The students knew that herbs are useful in healing the skin ulcers, mouth sores and other similar ailments in children in particular and adults in general.

A crucial aspect of the Bodo medicinal heritage lies in the art of preparing these herbal remedies.

Each step is a testament to the intergenerational knowledge that has been carefully preserved and passed down, turning these preparations into cultural heirlooms.

7. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

The use of the traditional medicine is limited.

Most of the people who practice traditional medicine are belongs to the stock of illiterate of half-literate villagers which one of the hurdle in the way of commercialization of the practice.

Many people, who rush for the modern medicine or knock at the doctors chambers, finally approach the traditional healer after they fail to get expected result. They treat them and heal the ailments almost in zero expenditure. The only financial benefits they get are tips from the patients in the form of minimum cash or a fowl.
